The Pollinator Project is an important environmental and educational initiative that will help the Friends develop science-based learning opportunities, as well as expand the scope of telling the story of Flight 93 to the next generation.

We are particularly grateful to the National Park Service for allowing the Friends and its partners to have the bee hives on site. The hives provide the public with a unique opportunity to learn about pollination and its value in restoring the memorial landscape at Flight 93 National Memorial in honor of the 40 passenger and crew members.

Over the summer, the Friends are continuing to develop new STEM and STEAM curriculum in partnership with Powdermill Nature Reserve and the Carnegie Museum of Natural History that will focus on the Pollinator Project, a new Native Bird Program, as well as the popular Plant a Tree at Flight 93 reforestation program. Educating the public about the importance of these subjects will help preserve the memorial for future generations and open new funding opportunities for the Friends.

These educational activities and programs will reach children as young as pre-K to fifth grade. The activities and programs currently in the design phase are being strongly geared with digital learning in mind, due to the unknown situation for the upcoming school year. While these activities will all have the capability to be completed on-site at Flight 93 National Memorial, all activities (including instructions, resources, and supply lists) will be available to teachers across the nation via the Friends' website. This has the added advantage to teachers leading a field trip to the memorial as they will be able to truly prepare their students for the visit.

As a special part of the Pollinator Project, the Friends have created a page on our website dedicated to the pollinators. The Pollinator Program webpage will continue to grow to feature not only the information for the bee species that live at Flight 93 National Memorial, but also a picture of EACH species! Were you aware that the National Memorial is home to 63 species of bees? Keep your eyes on the website for that page to go live – the pictures of each species will amaze you!

In celebration of National Pollinator Week from June 22-28, the Friends of Flight 93 hosted a Facebook Live with beekeeper Darci Sanner of Summer Smiles Honey Farm on June 23. The video is posted on our <u>Facebook page</u> so you can learn more about the Pollinator Program and why it is so important to healing the memorial landscape in honor of the 40 passenger and crew members.

Education Resources and Activities



The Friends of Flight 93 education resources and activities are available for download on our Education page!

These activities were sent to nearly 8,000 teachers in April and May as a resource for at home continuity education plans in response to the national health crisis.

Each activity includes class discussion questions that use the themes of courage and resilience to connect the story of Flight 93 with what we are all experiencing today. Our educator mailing list continues to grow, and the Friends are now able to reach 16 counties directly surrounding the memorial in Western PA, with a reach of approximately 30% of school districts across the entire state. The Friends educational lesson plans and activities will continue to be developed and updated, especially as we approach the September 11 observance date, and telling the story of Flight 93 to newer and younger audiences.

Developing this summer are STEM and STEAM curriculum plans that will integrate the Pollinator Project and a Native Bird Program with the story of Flight 93.

These two new programs give us an opportunity to educate younger audiences from pre-K to fifth grade, help them understand the memorial landscape, how and why it ties into the larger story of Flight 93 and the passenger and crew members, and expand our abilities to educate the next generation through science-based learning programs. As we continue to develop lesson plans for both in-classroom and virtual learning, we encourage you to check the Friends' website for updates on our education and outreach initiatives. We will be providing downloadable lesson plans as they are finalized. These specific activities are designed to work either digitally or paper-based, depending on the education continuity plans for your district.
