4. Where did the school announcement tell students the plane had crashed? (1:01)
 - a. Somerset County, at the old PBS strip mine
5. What did the students think watching the news on television about the World Trade Center? (1:23)
 - a. "This can't be happening. This is America. This happens in other places. We're untouchable."
6. What happened to the students' sense of security? Did they still feel safe? (1:50)
 - a. Rocked; No
7. What did the students physically feel when Flight 93 crashed? (2:06)
 - a. Shockwave; saw a fireball; shook the building

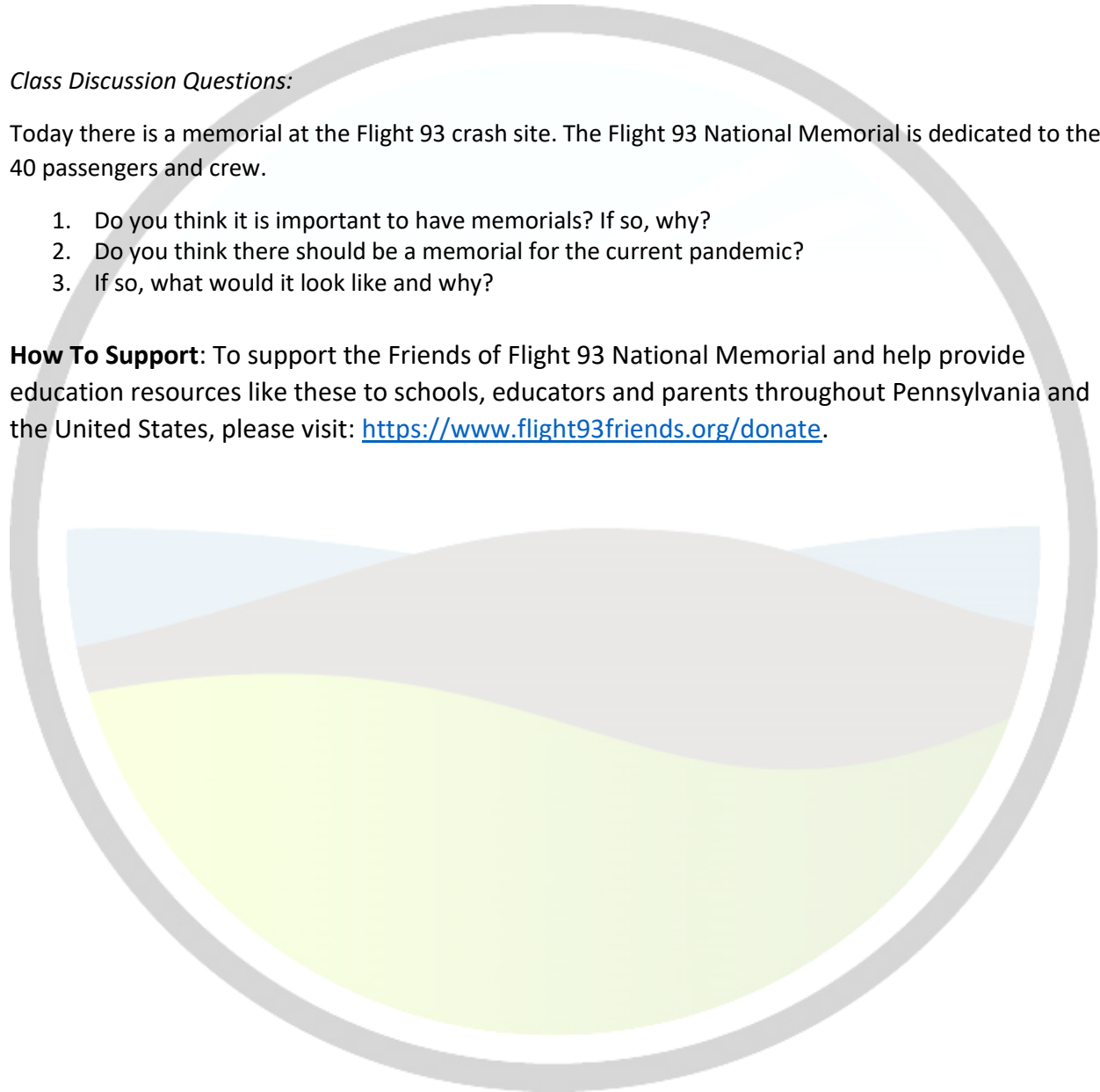
8. What did students see other students doing? (2:36)

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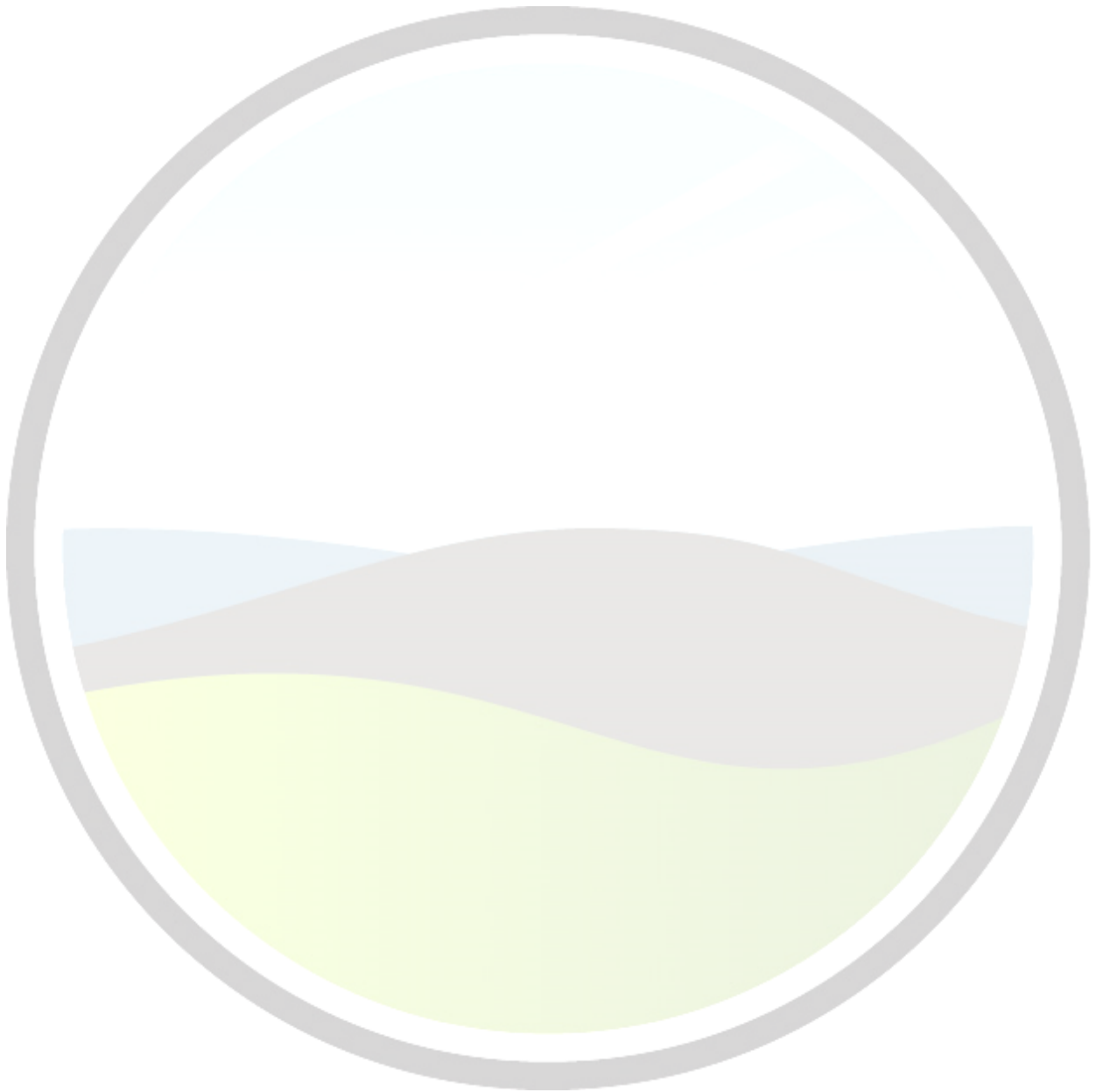
